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all it the Modi effect but China, which is expected to invest \$1.1 billion in India, mostly in Gujarat, seems to be more than eager to take its trade relations with the country to the next level. Even as an 18-member delegation comprising top Chinese investors and industrialists is scheduled to visit India tomorrow, a group of aspiring Chinese entrepreneurs are in Ahmedabad to break language barriers in order to explore business opportunities with Indian companies.

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
busy learning Mandarin in city colleges, 11 Chinese students are in city to get a grip over Hindi, one of the languages that is widely spoken in our country.

One of the EDI officers found out during a trip to China that the students there were interested in learning Hindi. It was then that the course was introduced at EDI.

These third year BA Hindi students at Yunnan Minzu University in China have enrolled for a ninemonth Business Hindi certificate course at Entrepreneurship Development Institute of India (EDI).

Their university has included the book "Narendra Modi ka Rajnaitik Safar (Narendra Modi's political journey)" in the syllabus. The book talks about Gujarat's growing economy and chronicles Modi's rise on Indian political-scape. It is after reading the book that the students grew curious about Gujarat and decided to visit the state to know more about its culture and entrepreneurial spirit.

sikhaun. (India is a great country and I am impressed with the culture of this country. I hope to teach students Hindi in the near future)," said Ming Yun, 21, one of the students.

The syllabus of the advance Hindi course at EDI includes Hindi poetry, short stories, works of Rabindranath Tagore and Munshi Premchand, Gopal Das Niraj and other important literary figures. These students will also be shown Hindi classics like Anand, Satyakam, Do Aankhen Barah Haath, Gandhi and Chupke Chupke since they are fans of Bollywood movies as well. Dr Avdhesh Jha,

programme director and associate professor said, "We have been teaching students about the history and culture of India. Students enrol for this course either to do business with Indian companies, or to work as translators or to teach Hindi in China.'

According to Dr Jha, one of the Chinese universities has also introduced Gujarati learning programme in its curriculum, as it believes Gujarat is a land of abundant business opportunities.
