established their own ventures, said EDII officials. These entrepreneurial endeavours spanned various sectors, ranging from car customization to warehouse management, sustainable fashion, and chemical production. Some have completed a year with a sizeableturnover, some have got seed funding, some have got investors and some are registered with the state and go-vernment-run incubation programmes.

Yashovardhan Kothari founded Build Well Infrastructure in Ratlam, focusing on the construction supply chain. Within a year, the venture achieved a turnover of around Rs 50 lakh. "My family business is diversified from power distribution to financing. But I decided to chart my own path supplying raw material to workers

needed for construction," he said.

Nandini Agarwal, based in the city, established Bindi, a sustainable fashion label that employs a factory-to-customer model, resulting in a turnover of about Rs 40 lakh in a year. She branched away from her father's garment manufacturing business. "We use the factory-to-customer model to cut cost and provide affordable formal apparels for women. I identified the idea while brainstorming during classroom sessions, identified the market needs and ecosystem," she said.

RNRavi, the governor of Tamil Nadu, was the chief guestat the event. In his address, hementioned that it is a time of comprehensiverevolutionary transformation. "This era is unfolding infini-

te opportunities for each one of us. So, you explore your destiny and soar high... The country in encouraging its youth to tap their energies and potential; it is creating an ecosystem where the youth can step forth. Today, India is the fastest growing economy in the world, with more than 1 lakh startups. This is only because of the enterprising spirit of our youth," he said.

sionhere. I wish to establisha luxury brand," she said. For BhartiKshirsagar, agazetted officer in Government of Gujarat, it was about learning the ropes of theory and practice of entrepreneurship that she can apply to her work in the government sector. "The mindset of an entrepreneur can also help in problem solving from areas ranging from climate change to malnutrition," she said.
